##### **Partnering Universities, Public Schools, and Community Organizations for Student Success**

**Tracks:** *P-16 Assessment; P-16 Classroom Strategies; Critical and Creative Thinking; Faculty / Professional Development / Learning Communities; Service Learning / Engagement; Technology*

Spalding University and Maupin Elementary School have been named by the Gheens Foundation as an Institute for Innovation. All three will partner to establish a restructuring of the elementary school which serves 600 students, most of who live below the poverty level. Spalding University's College of Education Dean (Dr. Beverly Keepers) and Associate Dean (Dr. James Takona), Maupin Elementary School Principal (Ms. Debbie Jones), and JCPS Resource Coordinator (Ms. Sondra Ferren) will present their collaboration and address the benefits both institutions receive. Audience members with K-12 and higher education will benefit by the uniqueness of this collaboration. Participants will experience selected activities implemented in the project such as use of multiple intelligences, student engagement in learning, and the creation of personal student interest classes.

##### **Factors That Influence Online Learning Transfer of Learning**

Working as small learning communities, selected teachers in these schools identified and implemented innovative instructional strategies focusing on the teaching of algebra. In this session, teams of "IEQ" teachers will discuss their strategies to improve the teaching of algebra and the informal assessment of these strategies. Thereafter, teams will reflect on the overall goal of the IEQ project: improving student achievement through innovative instructional practices.

#### **Improving Learning Through Technology**

Murray State University Teacher Quality Institute and ten school districts are using competitive grant funds from the CPE to develop a professional learning community focused on improving teacher math content knowledge and student achievement.

The session includes a demonstration of an online meeting with teachers, using national tests such as EXPLORE and PLAN to identify and remedy learning gaps, and using a classroom communication system (CCS or clickers) to guide instruction. Attendees will have an opportunity to use the CCS and discuss the use of assessment to guide instruction. The target audience is P-16 teachers, faculty, and staff.

#### **Identifying Learning Needs Using the True Colors Personality Typing System**

True Colors is a fun, interactive workshop that introduces you to temperament type. Based on the work of Don Lowry and the Meyers-Briggs Type Indicator, True Colors offers a research-based approach to understanding student behavior and motivation. True Colors uses the metaphor of four colors to identify four distinct perspectives and personalities. Knowing a student's primary and secondary “color” will provide teachers with clues to student self-esteem, learning modalities, strengths, needs, and what causes them stress and frustration. #### **Environmental Education in Kentucky Higher Education: Current Assessment and Deficiencies**

**Track:** Faculty / Professional Development / Learning Communities

To what extent are Kentucky higher education institutions, particularly state-funded four-year institutions, fulfilling their obligations to provide environmental education opportunities to the Commonwealth? Specifically, the extent to which students are able to avail themselves of environmentally oriented courses and programs and extracurricular organizations is presented. In addition, whether Kentucky universities have demonstrated environmental leadership through organizations such as the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education and Campus Compact and by making their campuses more environmentally sustainable is also discussed. Deficiencies in environmental education are identified and suggestions for improvement are made.

#### **Establishing Roots for a Strong STEM, Assessment Led Action Planning for Middle School Math and Science Teachers**

**Track:** Faculty / Professional Development / Learning Communities

Increasing the number of college graduates in STEM-related fields depends on active engagement in middle schools. This presentation focuses on the steps to creating a learning community of middle school math, science and special education teachers through data analysis, the creation of individual action plans, and an active digital community. Participants will use test scores, both EPAS and CATS, to analyze the professional development needs of a school, then through group discussion, create a SMAP (science-math action plan) for a middle school teaching team. Participants will learn the steps to creating a data-driven, embedded, teacher-centered professional development program.

#### **Positive Approaches to Classroom Management: Every Student Wants to be Good.**

**Track:** P-16 Classroom Strategies

This session will focus on positive approaches to creating a productive learning environment. Techniques for early engagement of students in positive behavior and pro-active reinforcement of appropriate social interactions will be demonstrated, explained, and practiced. Concepts such as protocols, teacher expectancy, clearly stated behavior expectations, creating positive rules, pinpointing of appropriate behaviors, selective ignoring, and proximity as well as basic behavior modification strategies (Premack principle, shaping, chaining, and reinforcement of incompatible behaviors) will be explored. This session will be presented as an interactive class and is appropriate for teachers of all grade levels from elementary through postsecondary.

**Nuts and Bolts of Online Tests in BlackBoard**

**Strategic Partnerships: Creating Greater Value in the Learning Commons**

*Track: Technology*

A partnership is a collaborative agreement between two or more parties in which all participants agree to work together to achieve a common purpose or undertake a specific task and to share risks, responsibilities, resources, competencies, and benefits. A recent trend in libraries and academia is the use of the term “commons” to describe spaces on campuses. Identifying a place or space as a commons implies a shared ownership of and responsibility for the space. This presentation will discuss the shared vision and ownership between partners at the University of Louisville to enhance the Learning Commons at the Ekstrom Library through the creation of a Digital Media Suite. The Digital Media Suite, a collaboration between Delphi Center for Teaching and Learning, Resource for Academic Achievement (REACH), and the Ekstrom Library, will be discussed as a case study for enhancing student’s access to multimedia technology and encouraging visual literacy skills. Presenters will also share how their resulting relationship has added value to the Learning Commons and enriched experiences and expertise of students and faculty. The presentation will benefit anyone interested in learning how to create a new strategic relationship or enhance an existing one to improve student learning.
