Rita G. Greer, a personnel specialist for the Jefferson County Public Schools in Louisville, Kentucky, is responsible for certified staffing of the district's 87 elementary and 13 special schools. Prior to entering personnel work, she was an administrative intern and coordinated the Minority Teacher Recruitment Project described in this fastback. A former teacher in grades 6 through 12, she has had extensive experiences in curriculum writing and program design and development.
